Introduction

It is my privilege to write these few words as an introduction to the "100 Years of Melton Bowls Club".

The Club was formed on 27th February 1905 on the initiative of Richard Bentham and eight men from Melton who were interested in Bowls. They very quickly laid down some rules, some of which are still in use today under "Federation Rules". The club was also a founding member of the Suffolk County (EBA) Bowling Association in 1934.

The club's first green was behind the Melton Parish Room, moving to their current location in Dock Lane in 1933, on land given to the club by Mr H W Burness. Since then, the club has developed considerably.

I have aimed in this book to provide a history of the club by extracting significant information from club records and setting it out in chronological order. I have included as many photographs as possible and other interesting information that I have been able to find, or recall, since I joined the club in 1975.

For completeness I include Appendices which list; Club Presidents, Names from Honours Boards, Members Achievements and Life Members.

I am the sixteenth President of the Club, and honoured to be President of Melton Bowls Club on our 100th Anniversary.

Although every care has been taken, it is inevitable that there may be some inaccuracies or omissions in compiling this account of Melton Bowls Club's history.

Extracts from Club Records

1905

On the invitation of Richard Bentham, "A meeting of those interested in Bowls was held on the evening of Monday, February 27th 1905. Mr Bentham was voted to the chair and it was resolved that a Club be formed,"

All those attending the meeting were elected to form a committee as follows:

At this first meeting it was agreed that:

subscriptions be 3/6 per season
 no one ever the age of 21 be allowed to join

• the groundsman be paid 2/6 per week to look after the green

The bowling green was situated at the rear of the Melton Parish Room on land provided rent free by Mr James A Burness, and the green opened for play on Wednesday 3rd May 1905 at 6.00pm.

On 15th May several "Rules of Play" were agreed:

- that "smitting" (firing) be not allowed
- that a bowl on the line be off and out of play
- that no bowl counts over 2 yards from the jack

In those days, boys were used to pick up and wipe the players' woods, and the club rules stated that "the boys are not allowed to play but must come to the green clean and properly attired, and also assist in rolling and keeping the green in order."

During 1905 matches were organised with the Sun Hotel (Woodbridge), Orford and Wickham Market Bowls Clubs. A club tournament was also organised with an entry fee of 6d per member.

1863 ~ 1943

Richard Bentham invited eight other men from Melton, interested in Bowls, to a meeting on 27th February 1905. At the meeting it was resolved to form a club, and Richard became the first Captain of Melton Bowls Club. He was Captain from 1905 to 1909 and then Secretary/Treasurer until 1915.



Richard Bentham was born in Drighlington in Lancashire and moved to Melton in 1893 to become headmaster of Melton School. He was described as a short, quick man with reddish hair, bright eyes and a Lancashire accent. Richard became very much part of village life. As well as being headmaster, he was Chairman of Old Melton St Andrew's Football Club, Choirmaster at St Andrew's Church, Secretary/Treasurer of the Doric Masonic Lodge and also Clerk to the Parish Council.

He was married to Hannah and they had five sons and three daughters.

At his funeral he was described as "a father to the parish".

1905 World Events:

The accounts for the first year were presented showing receipts of £4.17.6 and expenditure of £9.4.7 and a deficit of £4.7.1 It was agreed to keep the subscriptions at 3/6 but to organise a concert in October to pay off the debt! Matches against the Sun, Orford and Wickham Market were also arranged. At the end of the year, the accounts showed a deficit of 7/8 which "the worthy Chairman at once paid!"

1907

As there were no ditches around the green at this time, it was agreed that "a trench should be dug around the green about 6" wide to receive bowls out of play".

The first Press Report for Melton:

Melton Bowling Club v. Wickham Market Bowling Club.—On the Melton green on Wednesday, resulting in a win for the home club, after a well-contested game, by the narrow margin of five points. Scores:—Melton: A. T. Smithers 13. W. J. Wightman 6, J. T. Bilby 9, R. Bentham 9. W. Bilby 6, C. Green 8, H. Ward 10, E. J. Curtis 3, W. Masterson 6, W. Booth 9, J. Cousins 12, A. W. Skoulding 7, total 103. Wickham Market: J. W. Starling 7, — Precious 7, — Haken 5, — Zissell, sen., 8, G. Harris 12, J. Read 12, W. Turthill 7, S. Mattin 11, W. Finch 9, T. Minks 6, R. Thompson 4, — Zissell, jun., 10, total 98.

A win for Melton by 5 points v Wickham Market BC

The club held their first Annual Dinner at the end of the season on Friday 4th October 1907

1908

Mr J A Burness was elected as the first President of Melton Bowls Club.

1910

Additional matches were added this year against the Woodbridge Crown and Earl Soham, and also at various private greens. A "Handicap Tournament" was also run.

1912

A Local Tournament Committee was formed with 4 members from each club including the Woodbridge Crown and Sun, and from Melton. It was hoped to get 50 entries for the Singles and Triples competitions. It was agreed that "biased" bowls only be used and that disputes as to qualification of bowls be left to Messrs W Hayward, G Giles and R Bentham.

It was agreed that a handkerchief could be held to show the jack only but bowls not to be shown!

1914

As well as the usual matches, the tournament was becoming successful:

Singles tournament: 49 entries, played 11 up, entry fee 1/6

1st prize £1, 2nd 15/-, 3rd 10/-, 4th 10/-

Team Tournament: 18 blocks, played 13 up, 1st prize 30/-,

2nd 24/-, 3rd 18/-, 4th 12/6

And the list of Requirements for the tournament was interesting:

9 gallons of beer

6 doz bottles of beer

barrell of ginger beer

9 bottles of whisky

bottle of port

12 bottles of soda

24 bottles of lemonade

And last of all.....a bunch of bananas!!

Sounds like they had a good tournament!!

And someone must have kept sober as all results are recorded in the minute book!!

1915 - 1918

The club was closed due to the First World War.

Melton Bowls Club affiliated to the Suffolk County Bowls Association (Federation).

1927

10

Report to the AGM on 3rd April:

During the season 14 matches were played of which Melton won 8. Two teams entered the Suffolk County Cup Competition but unfortunately did not get very far. Tournaments at Lowestoft, Sudbourne and Framlingham were entered. During the season members received kind invitations to tea and bowls from Miss White Jervis, Mrs & Miss Villiers, Brig. Gen. Tanner, Sir William Churchman, Rev. J H Orpen, H F Sullivan and H S Carey.

Membership for the season was 40 against 52 the previous year, and subscriptions were 5/-

1928

A meeting was held to discuss the offer of a piece of land on the recreation meadow for the purpose of making a bowling green. After lengthy discussion it was thought hopeless to entertain the idea of making a green there owing to the financial position of the club. (The club made a profit of £3.18.4 in 1927)

1930

Meetings were held concerning the state of the green which was deteriorating. It was agreed to be inadvisable to undertake any repairs unless the whole green could be taken up and re-laid. Due to lack of funds the matter was left in obeyance.

1931

At the AGM it was agreed to affiliate to the SCBA (EBF) and enter teams in the Senior and Junior Cups.

1932

A special General Meeting was held on 17th May to discuss whether the present green could be made good or whether another ground was required. Mr H W Burness had been in touch with Mr Bloss about a piece of ground in Dock Lane to hire or purchase. The lease would be £7 per year on a lease of 7, 12 or 21 years, or to purchase for £100, and it was unanimously agreed to purchase the ground. H W Burness bought the land and donated it to the club and also defrayed the legal costs. A special committee of H W Burness, W Read, T King, A Pemberton and C Meekins was elected to oversee the purchase of the new ground.

In October, it was agreed for Mr Pemberton to cut a trench through the green to show how he would level the green and submit an estimate. H W Burness agreed to donate turf from his estate which was greatly appreciated by the club.

The following expenses were incurred for the new green:

Wire for fencing	£4.3.6
Making Gate	£1.9.0
Levelling ground	£45.10.
Cutting turfs	£10.10.
Laying turf	£8.5.0
Carting turf	£3.12.6
TOTAL	£73.10.

At the AGM it was agreed to raise money to pay for the new green by getting members to loan money to the club in half-crown shares. Loans would be repaid on the death of a member, or when club funds would permit, to bear interest at 2.5%

Subscriptions were 6/- per season

1933

On 5th May it was agreed that the new green was fit for play and the Club President, H F Sullivan, opened the green on 3rd June 1933.



A Special General Meeting was held on 10th July, in connection with the gift of land by H W Burness, to appoint four trustees: W Read, E S Lock, R H Howard and S Rush. The powers of the trustees, drawn up by E R Wood, Solicitors, Woodbridge were agreed and a copy is in the minute book.

The gift of the ground for the new green placed the club in an absolutely sound position, and envied by many bowls clubs in Suffolk. Mr Thompson made an oak tablet giving particulars of the gift which was placed in the pavilion. (This tablet is still displayed in the clubhouse today.)

On their new green, the club played in the Senior and Junior Cups, Sullivan Cup, Paget Cup, Thurlow Cup and also took part in the Wickham Market League. They also entered the Sudbourne and Felixstowe Tournaments, and had two representatives in the two County games against Norfolk.

Membership had grown to 55 against 40 for the previous year.

Subscriptions were raised to 7/6d and payable in instalments if necessary.

The new Pavilion was insured for £70 at a premium of 15/- per year. The Water Company had installed a meter at a rental of 3/6 per quarter, with a minimum charge of 5/- for 2000 gallons and thereafter 2/6 per 1000 gallons.

The owners of the Coach and Horses agreed to make an opening to the garden at the back of the Coach and Horses; this concession would do away with the Club building a convenience!!

The club now seemed to be prospering with more members and more competitive matches being played.

1934

It was decided to repay part of the loan to members and £18.5.0 was repaid to 22 members.

Melton Bowls Club became one of the founding members of the newly-formed Suffolk and Norfolk County Bowling Association (EBA).

The green was now being used by visiting players for County Competition games.

1935

E S Lock and D Friar were picked to play for the Suffolk and Norfolk EBA County Team against Essex.

1936

The Melton BC Secretary, E S Lock, became the Suffolk Area B (SCBA) Secretary, which brought honour to the club.

Members of the club were now being selected to play in County matches:

E S Lock played against Norfolk for SCBA, D Friar and E S Lock played against the Essex EBA.

Two friendly fixtures were held with The Haven Hotel EBA Club and Gippeswyk Bowls Club along with other visiting clubs for cup ties. This brought in an additional £2.7.6.

The loan outstanding to members was now reduced to £9.8.0 and hoped to be cleared this year. With the loan cleared the members can feel that everything within the enclosure is theirs.

1937

The SCBA inaugurated their Benevolent Fund and the club unanimously supported the scheme (The Benevolent Fund is still in operation today).

A motion was put to the AGM on "Stakes on Games" to be ceased, but no objection should be made to those members who wished, by mutual arrangement. to have a Stake on the Game!

A wooden roller weighing approximately 1½ cwt, was purchased.

1938

R W Thompson the clubs Secretary/Treasurer was appointed Hon. Secretary to the Suffolk County EBA Bowls Association – a post which he held for 11 years.

Melton BC won the Daniels Hospital Charity Cup having played the following Leiston Con by 31 shots

clubs:

Woodbridge Sun by 28 shots

Grundisburgh by 14 shots

Saxmundham by 7 shots in the Area Final

Claydon by 35 shots in the Semi-Final

Borough & County by 49 shots in the Final at Golden Hind BC.

H W Burness, Club President and Club Benefactor died.

The season ended abruptly at the beginning of September due to the outbreak of hostilities. This was the start of the Second World War.


1940 - 1944

No County Competitions were played and the activities of the EBA were suspended.

During the war, the club was kept going but only a few friendly matches were played with other clubs along with some tournaments.

The Club unanimously agreed that any member of HM Forces be allowed to play on the green free of charge and be allowed to play in tournaments. Also, that any member of the Club joining HM Forces shall remain a member of the club without payment of subscription.

Several tournaments were held with the profit going to the Red Cross and St. John Funds.

1946

After the War, the County Associations were up and running again, and the Clubs were taking part in Leagues and County Competitions.

1947

After lengthy discussion at the AGM it was agreed that ordinary membership of the Club be open to Ladies!

1948

The Club was looking at the possibility of purchasing a piece of land from Mr F Bloss to lengthen the green.

A Ladies Section was formed.

Now that bread was not rationed, the club was able to do refreshments for visiting clubs again.

The Club entertained their first Touring Team on the Melton green from Derbyshire.

Mr E S Lock (Edgar), a past Secretary of Melton BC, became President of the Suffolk County Bowling Association.

After much discussion about purchasing additional land, Mr F Bloss wrote to the Club saying he was pleased to present the adjoining piece of land to the Club as a free gift. F Bloss was offered Vice Presidency of the Club for Life.

1950

Plans and costings were prepared for the work to extend the green. This was estimated at £150 or £400 if contractors were employed to do the work.

1952

After much discussion it was agreed that the club could not afford to extend the green and was put on hold until finances were in place. It was felt better to spend money on improving the existing green.

1961

Melton BC joined the Woodbridge & District League for the first time.

1967

R C Daines (Bob) was elected to be Club Secretary, a post he held for 15 years.

It was agreed that the Ladies Section of the Club be disbanded and the ladies become direct members of Melton Bowls Club.



1970

The main topic of discussion at the AGM was a proposal from Mr D Allen to consider the sale of land adjoining the bowling green. This included new fencing to the front and rear of the club and a sum of money agreeable to both

1907 ~ 1992

Bob Daines was born in the Parish of Melton in the house next to the Basket Works in Daines Lane, owned by his father. He was a very active man in the village and spent his whole life in Melton. He never wanted to live anywhere else. He spent most of his leisure time involved with sport. He started the Old Melton St Andrew's Football Club along with Richard Bentham and started the Cricket Club after the Second World War.

Bob was also very much involved with Melton Bowls Club. For 15 years he was Secretary/Treasurer. He was also Greenkeeper, Captain, Barman, and ran bingo on a Friday night in the Parish Room to raise money for the Bowls Club. He was regarded by most club members as "Mr Melton". Bob was also very proud to be the Club President from 1986 to 1992, and was honoured to be the first Club President to wear the "Ribbon of Office". The club still flies the flag which Bob donated to the club in 1983.

Bob always had the club very much at heart and always did the best he could for the club. However, with not very many members there was little income to maintain the green and clubhouse. It was not until 1981 when the clubhouse was extended,

which attracted more members, and more income, that Bob could see the green and facilities improve.

I am sure that Bob would be pleased with the current condition of the green, our facilities, and the successes the club has had over recent years.

parties. After much discussion the committee agreed to get an estate agent to value the piece of land.

1971

An Extraordinary General Meeting was called to discuss the sale of land adjoining the green. Mr D Allen addressed the meeting, outlining the following proposal: To erect double entrance gates, a low brick wall and piers with timber fence for the full frontage of the property, a wooden fence separating the plot from the green, plus a sum of £750 for the plot. After discussion the proposal was accepted unanimously.

It was also agreed to enter the Ipswich Bowls 2 wood League to give members more matches, because the Woodbridge League was now run as two sections.

The highlight of the season was reaching the final of the Senior Cup, loosing by a narrow margin to Suffolk Lawnmowers on the Waterside Works green.

1972

In their first year in the Ipswich Bowls League, Melton won their division by ½ point over Fisons BC. The club also applied to join the EBA and had until the spring of 1973 to get the green into a satisfactory condition before they could enter the league.

Mrs E M Burness was elected President of the club.

The sale of the land was completed. R Daines suggested the club applies for a License to sell drinks for the 1973 season. An extension to the clubhouse was started, and it was agreed that it should be wired up and electricity laid on.

1974

After exceptional heavy expenditure, including pavilion enlargement, installing electricity and the purchase of a travelling sprinkler, the clubs total assets were around £500.

It was agreed to have a club tie for the first time, in maroon with a crest, and 36 ties were ordered.

Men's subscriptions were £2 and ladies £1.

1977

With more members joining the club, there was a growing need for more efficient toilets, particularly for the ladies. (There were no toilets within the pavilion). To raise more funds towards this, it was agreed to raise subscriptions to £3.50 for men and £2.50 for ladies. The club was now in three leagues (Ipswich 2 Wood League, Woodbridge League, and the EBA Triples League).

Jim Carter started a "100 Club" to raise funds for clubhouse improvements.

1978

Discussions started on how to extend the pavilion to provide a new bar, and include ladies and gents toilets. It was estimated that the new pavilion would cost approximately £7000, and new toilets and sewer connection £3000.

Bill Smith and Cecil Leach were finalists in the EBA County Pairs and took part in the National Championships at Worthing. They won their first game against Devon (22-21) but lost in their next to a strong pair from Cornwall (26-17). Several club members travelled down to Worthing to support Bill and Cecil.

The EBA was becoming stricter on players wearing grey trousers and white tops in all competitions.

Frank Proctor was elected as Club President.

1980

Quotations were received for building the new toilet block. £1500 for construction plus £577 for connection to the main sewer pipe in Dock Lane. The sewer connection was made in April. The club had about £900 available for the building work and hoped to raise the remainder by fund raising and a loan from the brewery. It was aimed to complete the work by the start of the next season.

1981

By February, the roof was completed in a snow storm and all other work was on track. The electrics and plumbing were completed by the end of March. All internal fitting was completed and ready for the official opening by the Club President, Frank Proctor, on 2nd May. All the work, except some of the roofing, was carried out by club members in their spare time. The total cost was £2057 and was financed mainly by the 100 club with fetes and jumble sales also raising funds. The club was indebted to all those who helped including members' wives, and the lady members of the club.

With the clubs new facilities, several new members joined the club including several ladies. The bar was making more money for the club and crib and whist drives were organised throughout the winter months.

1982

Blazer badges and lapel badges were designed and purchased to complement the clubs new tie.

With the clubs new facilities, bowlers were eager to join the club and the committee had to introduce a limit of 70 full members.


The club affiliated to the Ladies EBA for the first time and friendly matches were arranged against Roundwood, Ipswich & District and Framlingham.

Also this year the club hosted a SCBA Executive match, SCWBA Vice Presidents Match and an Ellen Mathews match. These matches and the increase in membership brought much needed funds into the club. The turnover for the year was £4707.

1983

1983 saw the club celebrate its Jubilee (50 years on the present site at Dock Lane) and several things were planned for the celebration.

Bob Daines agreed that if the club would provide a flag pole, he would donate a flag to the club. This flag is still in use today and flown at all major occasions (See Back Cover). Frank Plume donated new Honours Boards. (These are now mounted on the ceiling with honours recorded

until 1999. New boards for 2000 onwards are mounted below them).

A fete was held on the playing field (opened by Lady Hutchison) which made a profit of £523. Also held were a Jubilee Pairs tournament for club members, an open tournament, a club photograph, and a bowls match at Sole Bay with dinner afterwards at the Flixton Buck.

With more bowling members, the club entered the Ipswich Triples league in

addition to the EBA Triples, Woodbridge and Ipswich 2 Wood Leagues. The club won the Mercury Shield, beating Saxmundham Sports 81-68.

1984

The first "keep fit" class for the ladies, organised by Betty Plume, was held on Wednesday afternoons in the clubhouse.

The greenkeeper took advice from Herman Kindred, the greenkeeper at Framlingham Castle BC, on the programme of work required to improve the surface of the Melton green. The Framlingham green was considered to be the best surface to bowl on in the area.

An invitation tournament was sponsored by Blyth Hasel of Melton. Before the final, an exhibition match was played between Nigel Smith from Essex and the club chairman, Trevor Lord, resulting in an honourable draw!

1985

A new watering system for the green was installed, fed from a storage tank in the corner of the site.

The opening day commenced with a drive but was cut short after only 4 or 5 ends due to a snow storm which completely covered the green.

A Special General Meeting was held to discuss the development of the whole site including an extension to the green and a new lounge area. The new lounge area would include a new bar and kitchen with the existing bar extended to provide a changing room. Estimates for a builder to do the work were £12000, or about £6000 with voluntary labour. This was approved. Planning permission was received and work started. Various fund raising activities were held including a dance. An interest free loan of £5000 over 5 years was received from Greene King Brewery.

Frank Proctor, the club President, died. A seat in his honour was donated to the club by his daughter.

During the season the club played 91 matches of which 61 were won, 1 drawn and 29 lost. We won the Ipswich league, the EBA League, the Salter Cup, Jubilee Shield and Sun Bowl. We also reached the semi-finals of the Senior Cup and the Mercury Shield.

1986

All the building work was completed during the winter to provide a new lounge area, kitchen, bar and changing room. This was opened by the club's new President, Bob Daines. The cost of the new extension was £8445.



Muriel Backhouse, the club treasurer, was elected SCWBA President for 1986. Muriel held her President's Day at the Melton Club with a match on the green for 56 ladies, all in whites – quite a sight! All the ladies had a sit down meal after the match and were served by the male members of the Melton committee.

The club also hosted two SCWBA friendly matches against Durham and Lincolnshire.

The EBA County President, Terry Bacon, also brought a team to play a friendly match against the club. We also hosted a Ladies Vice Presidents match and also a touring side from Leicestershire. A very busy bowling season for the club!

Having a larger lounge area, the club bought a short mat, and friendly matches were arranged for the winter months.

During the winter new concrete ditches were installed on two sides of the green. A grant was made by Melton Parish Council of £450 towards the concrete ditches.

A Special General Meeting was held to approve an extension to the green. The proposal was to extend by $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet on the south side and by 6 feet on the north side, along with suitable paving for all four sides of the green, which was agreed. The south side was completed and the north side deferred until sufficient funds were available.

We reached the final of the Junior Cup, won the EBA Triples League and also the Woodbridge League.

1987

With more members, it was decided to enter another league, to give members more competitive matches, and the Finn League was entered for the first time. It was also decided to enlarge the committee and appoint a fixture and social secretary to deal with more matches and social events.

1988

Jack Snow, EBA County President and previously a member of the club, brought a Presidents Team to play against the Melton Club.

1990

Mrs E M Burness, President of the club from 1940-45 and 1971-74, celebrated her 100th birthday. The club sent her flowers and a card signed by our members.

The club obtained a "Ribbon of Office" for our current and future Presidents, inscribed with all the names of our club Presidents. Bob Daines expressed pride when presented with the Ribbon of Office especially as he was the first President to receive it.

The extension to the green, by 6 feet, in front of the clubhouse was started by removing approximately 80 tons of soil from the bank. Concrete ditches were then laid, a

retaining wall built and paving laid in front of the clubhouse. The new part of the green was then levelled, settled and seeded. The total cost of all the work on the green and surrounds was £4370.

Just over 100 matches were played in 6 leagues and 8 knock out cups! Membership was 80 Full Members, 2 Juniors and 15 Social Members

1991

The season opened with the EBA Under 25's County side playing Huntingdonshire on our green with three of our young players playing for the county.

During the season we gained promotion in the Woodbridge League and won the Salter Cup. With our improved green and facilities, the club was now hosting more County Finals.

By coincidence, the club hosted the final of the County EBA Under 25's Singles which was won by Mark Addison from our club.

1992

This was both a sad and happy year for the club. Sad at the passing of Bob Daines, the Club President, who had done so much for the club over many years.

And a happy year due to many successes. The club won the EBA Quinton Bowl for the first time.

Sandie Andrews and Ann West won the SCWBA Pairs, and several members were selected to play for the County Teams.

1993

The club reached the semi-finals of the Senior Cup and the Quinton Bowl (won the previous year).


